Course Summary: Embark on a journey through time and uncover the secrets of the past, exploring historical research and archaeological methods to understand how we learn about bygone eras.

Course Description:

This 8-week course offers a captivating exploration of the past, delving into the methods and techniques used to uncover historical knowledge. Learn how historians and archaeologists work, how they evaluate evidence, and how they construct narratives about bygone societies.

Through a series of case studies, you'll investigate key events and discoveries from across history, including the Roman Empire, the Norman Conquest, the Wars of the Roses, and the Cold War. You'll also explore archaeological sites and artifacts, gaining insights into the daily lives, beliefs, and social structures of past peoples.

What will I learn?

Weeks 1-4: Discovering the past through historical research

- Week 1: What is history?
 - Define history and its significance in understanding the present.
 - Discuss the role of historians and their methods of inquiry.
- Week 2: How do historians work?
 - Explore the process of historical research, including source analysis and interpretation.
 - Discuss the challenges and limitations of historical research.
- Week 3: Trusting primary and secondary sources

- Learn to evaluate the reliability and authenticity of primary and secondary sources.
- Discuss bias, perspective, and context in historical sources.
- Week 4: Case studies in historical research
 - Analyze a selection of case studies from across history, including:
 - Emperor Nero
 - Norman Conquest
 - Wars of the Roses
 - Witch trials in Britain
 - The Enlightenment
 - Death of Prince Albert
 - Russian Revolution
 - The Cold War

Weeks 5-8: Discovering the past through archaeology

- Week 5: What is archaeology?
 - Define archaeology and its role in uncovering the past.
 - Discuss the different branches of archaeology and their methods.
- Week 6: How do archaeologists work?
 - Explore the process of archaeological excavation and analysis.
 - Discuss the use of technology and scientific methods in archaeology.
- Week 7: How much can we know from archaeology?
 - Evaluate the reliability and limitations of archaeological evidence.
 - Discuss the interpretation of archaeological findings and the construction of narratives.
- Week 8: Case studies in British archaeology
 - Analyze a selection of case studies from British archaeology, with a focus on Devon and Cornwall where possible, including:
 - Archaeology of religion

- Forensics and human remains
- Burial and grave goods
- Archaeology of social structure
- Archaeology of trade and economics
- Underwater archaeology
- Archaeology of settlements and buildings
- Archaeology of warfare

How will I be assessed?

- Formative: Participation in class discussions and weekly reflective writing prompts.
- Summative: A final research project on a chosen historical or archaeological topic, and a presentation summarizing key findings.

Who is this course for?

This course is designed for anyone with an interest in history, archaeology, and learning about the past, regardless of prior knowledge or background.

Progression Opportunities:

Upon completion, learners can consider further educational opportunities in history, archaeology, anthropology, or related fields. Explore higher education programs or specialized courses to deepen your understanding of the past.

Career or Job Enhancement Pathways:

- Historian: Conduct research, analyze sources, and write historical accounts.
- Archivist: Preserve and manage historical documents and records.
- Museum Curator: Develop exhibits and educational programs related to history and archaeology.

 Archaeologist: Conduct excavations, analyze artifacts, and interpret archaeological findings.
